


Total Budget by Source

Revenue Reductions

- Treasury March
 - \$1 billion \$3 billion in FY20
 - \$1 billion \$4 billion in FY21
- UofM Research Seminar in Quantitative Economics (RSQE) April
 - \$2.6 billion in FY20
 - \$3.2 billion in FY21

General Fund COVID 19 Appropriations




- \$50 million in flexible state immediate needs
- \$50 million for hospitals and health providers
- \$50 million additional upon transfer by the Appropriations committees

Federal COVID 19 Funds

- FEMA
 - Covers many direct state COVID 19 emergency expenditures
 - 25% state/local match unless waived
- Federal CARES Act
 - Coronavirus Relief Fund
 - \$800 million to local units with populations > 500,000
 - \$3.1 billion to the state for the following:
 - COVID 19 Costs
 - That weren't in existing state budgets
 - And were incurred from March 1 to December 31, 2020



Federal CARES Act Education Funds



- Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund: \$389.8 million
- Governor's Education Emergency Relief Fund: \$89.4 million
- Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund: \$347.4 million

Allowable Uses

Broad discretion including:

- Any activity authorized by the ESEA, Support and Assistance Act, IDEA, Adult Education and Family Literacy Act, Perkins, or parts of McKinney-Vento.
- Assistance to school resources for necessary resources to address needs in schools.
- Activates addressing the needs of students in many categories include: at-risk, ELL, children with disabilities, and minorities.
- Purchasing educational technology.
- Other virus response activities including training, sanitation, meals, mental health, etc.

Governor's Education Emergency Relief Fund	\$89.4 million	Local educational agencies. Institutions of higher education. Allowable Uses

• Activities that are necessary to **continue to provide educational services** to students and to support the **on-going functionality** of the local educational agencies.

• The provision of childcare and early childhood education, social and emotional support, and the protection of education-related jobs.

• Purposes allowed under the Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief Fund described previously

Allowable Uses

• Funds may be used to cover any costs associated with significant changes to the delivery of instruction due to the coronavirus.

• 50% of funds must be used to provide **emergency financial aid grants to students** for expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to coronavirus (food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, childcare, and other cost of attendance items)



Budget Timeline

- Current State Action
 - Hiring Freeze
 - Discretionary Spending Freeze
 - Evaluate other potential budget reductions
- Consensus Revenue Estimating Conference May 15
- Balance FY 20 Budget soon after
- Begin FY 21 Budget discussions
 - Revisit revenue estimates in August after postponed income tax collection in July
